

# Finding a place to belong: Nataliya's story

Nataliya started coming to The Gathering Place in late 2011. She, her husband, and her son, Timothy, had recently moved to Denver from Los Angeles and she was looking for a place where Timothy could play with other children and she could get help finding resources in the community. She was also pregnant with Divine, her now seven-monthold daughter.

"My husband is diabetic and has trouble with his feet. He has worked a lot of different jobs, but isn't working right now," Nataliya says. "We can't afford to do many things in the community. Without The Gathering Place, we'd just be at home in our apartment all day.

"Timothy can play with other children here and The Card Project gives me something to do. I can see other people and learn about American culture."

A native of the Ukraine, Nataliya moved to the United States seven years ago. And though she misses her family, Nataliya says she is able to keep in touch with them by using Skype and she hopes to someday go back to visit.

"I remember when Nataliya first

came to The Card Project," says Denise Lines, The Card Project coordinator. "She was very shy, timid, and reserved. Over time, she started to make friends—especially with our volunteers—and has moved from sitting right near the door to sitting further inside the room."



Her cards and triptychs, made with pressed flowers, are extremely popular, says Lines.

"In my country, we dry flowers in old books," Nataliya says. "So, I use this technique on my cards and art. In the Ukraine, we have a lot of flowers. Here, right now, not so much."

As Kathy Poirier, director of family services, began to get to know Nataliya and Timothy, she noticed that Timothy seemed to be delayed in his language development.

> She suggested having him evaluated at Child Find, a program of the Denver Public School system, and Nataliya agreed.

"We learned that he is somewhat delayed, but it is probably because I am teaching him two languages at once," Nataliya says, noting that he is learning Russian along with English. "When he can't think of a word in English, sometimes he will just use baby talk."

Timothy was placed in an early childhood learning program at Whittier Elementary, which he attends every day for two and a half hours. He also has a speech therapist visit him at home once a week.

"Timothy's language skills and his social skills have improved so much since his family started coming to The Gathering Place," says Poirier.

"At first, he was just a nervous ball of energy, but now he loves to come and play with the staff, volunteers, and other children. One day he walked in, threw his arms up in the air, and announced 'I'm here!""

"Timothy calls The Gathering Place 'Choo Choo Place', because of the trains," says Nataliya. "They are his favorite toy. He is always asking if we can go to Choo Place."

# Westword articles follow and profile women at The Gathering Place



The cover story of *Westword's* December 6, 2012 issue, "Bed Check," examined the shortage of shelter beds available for women in the Denver metro area. According to the article, only 252 beds—less than 20% of the shelter spaces in the city—were available for single women at the time of publication, but the 2012 Metro Denver Homeless Initiative Point-in-Time Study estimated that 34% of the city's homeless population were women. Denver's Road Home has since opened a cold weather emergency drop-in shelter on West Colfax with 50 mats available for single

women. This new shelter will be open through April 2013.

While working on the article, writer Sam Levin shadowed a number of women as they participated in the lottery process for both the Women's Homeless Initiative at St. Francis Center and The Delores Project at The Gathering Place. In addition, Levin interviewed our CEO **Leslie Foster** and Resource Advocate **Ashley Biekarck**, who are both quoted in the article.

In an effort to support the health of those we serve at The Gathering Place, we prefer organic, low-sodium, and low-fat food item donations whenever possible. According to the Colorado Health Foundation, two out of three Coloradoans will be obese by 2017 and will suffer from obesity related diseases. The likelihood that an individual will experience obesity triples when their family income is less than \$25,000 a year.

# The hub of activity at The Gathering Place: The Resource Desk

A primary tenet of The Gathering Place's service model is to engage staff and volunteers as advocates working with, not simply for, our members. One of the best places to see this philosophy in action is at our Resource Desk. Located on the west side of the first floor at The Gathering Place, the Resource Desk is our organization's busy hub of information and scheduling.

Throughout the course of a typical day, individuals at The Gathering Place will seek support from one of our five resource advocates or our trained volunteers, the result of which is an interaction with a highly specialized, patient individual who can offer information on a wide variety of resources within the Denver social services community.

In the morning, activity at the Resource Desk is typically focused on overnight shelter lottery sign-ups and making appointments to use our private showers, laundry facilities, and nap room. As the day progresses, members come to the Resource Desk to check their mail and messages, make appointments for Betsy's Cupboard, request over the counter medications, like aspirin and Benedryl, and pick up resource lists for additional food pantries in the metro area, clothing resources, job training programs, and more.

If a member needs more than just a resource list, the advocates are equipped to provide further assistance. For example, if a member approaches the Resource Desk requesting information about rental assistance, an advocate can provide the prepared list, but also begin a discussion with the member about whether or not they are in imminent danger of losing existing housing, or if they are trying to find a new place to live. The outcome of that conversation can then guide the advocate to share information about additional resources available either at The Gathering Place or in the community. Each of these conversations between an advocate and a member are unique, tailored to address the specific needs and situations of each individual.

During these interactions, our advocates begin to lay the groundwork for self-advocacy and self-sufficiency. They do this by providing information, offering suggestions, and making referrals, all while building strong, positive relationships with the members. These relationships allow the advocates to continue to support members as they seek to access additional information or resources.
