The Gathering Place, founded in 1986, is a community of safety and hope where positive relationships, choice, and essential resources transform the lives of women, children, and transgender individuals experiencing poverty and homelessness. We refer to those we serve as "members" and our generous donors ensure that our programs and services are provided free of charge.

We believe deeply in the power of our community and continually work to make it stronger. Our key values include recognizing individual strengths, building respect and trust, and offering unconditional acceptance. We are not just a service organization; we are committed advocates for those we serve.





who we serve

Our members face a mix of challenges that can make it nearly impossible to meet vital survival needs, let alone find economic stability. Hunger. Safety. Unreliable transportation. No childcare. Mental and physical health issues. Living in shelter. Trauma. Often, a member faces more than one of these issues at any given time and sometimes chronically.

what we do

The Gathering Place offers comprehensive services and programs during the day when shelters are closed. Our programs utilize trauma-informed care practices; have essentially no barriers to service; and are responsive to crisis situations.

Our goal is to give our members opportunities to meet basic needs, foster personal growth, promote social enterprise, and build a community support system that is often lacking in their lives. "The Gathering Place is extremely helpful because right now, I am homeless and I am in dire need. This place is a haven, I would say, for those in need."

Resource Advocates on the Community Access

Team (CAT) respond to members' immediate needs with services that include showers, laundry, naps, mail service, locker storage, telephone access, and an extensive array of resources and referrals.

Our **Education and Job Readiness Program** helps members advance their education and improve their employment potential.

PAIRIN system of assessments and coaching. This program is designed to help individuals develop their "soft skills." For our members, these underdeveloped skills are often one of the most significant barriers to employment. By implementing PAIRIN, we have strengthened our job readiness training by performing assessments and leading members in intense coaching that not only improves our member's ability to get a job, but perhaps more importantly, to keep one.

During the six-month pilot, three staff members trained in the PAIRIN system, and 25 members took the assessment and participated in coaching appointments 30 times.

THE WELLNESS PEER NAVIGATORS SUPPORTED 594 MEMBERS

This year also introduced our **Peer Navigator Program**. Peer Navigators are individuals with lived experience similar to that which our members face, but who are now experiencing stability and can help others navigate systems and processes. During the pilot program, the Wellness Peer Navigators supported 594 members.

741 MEMBERS VISITED THE COMPUTER LAB 4,099 TIMES

In the **Computer Lab**, members can utilize computers, access the Internet, and print documents. The lab is staffed by volunteers who are available to help members develop their computer literacy in an increasingly technology-driven world.



The **Physical and Mental Health Program** helps members access health care information, services, and referrals. The program regularly brings partner agencies and pro bono health professionals on site to serve members, thereby overcoming various barriers to care (e.g., transportation).

The **Arts Program** provides a variety of creative outlets such as making greeting cards, knitting and crocheting, open art, and creative writing and music groups. These endeavors have intangible benefits such as increased self-esteem, being part of a caring community, and the opportunity to engage in creative expression.

Bridget's Boutique, our clothing bank, distributes clothing to members who have an emergency need for replacement clothes or need clothes for employment reasons. Professional stylists also provide free haircuts.

We aim to provide periodic trauma-informed care trainings for staff, Board, volunteers, and members to create a safe community. These initiatives are advanced by two agency committees: the **Trauma-Informed Care team** and **Team Inclusion**, our diversity and inclusion committee.

Leadership opportunities for members include participation in the **Member Engagement Steering Committee**, which gives members a voice in our governance. We also offer meaningful volunteer opportunities that promote direct involvement in providing services, such as running Bridget's Boutique or the Computer Lab.


